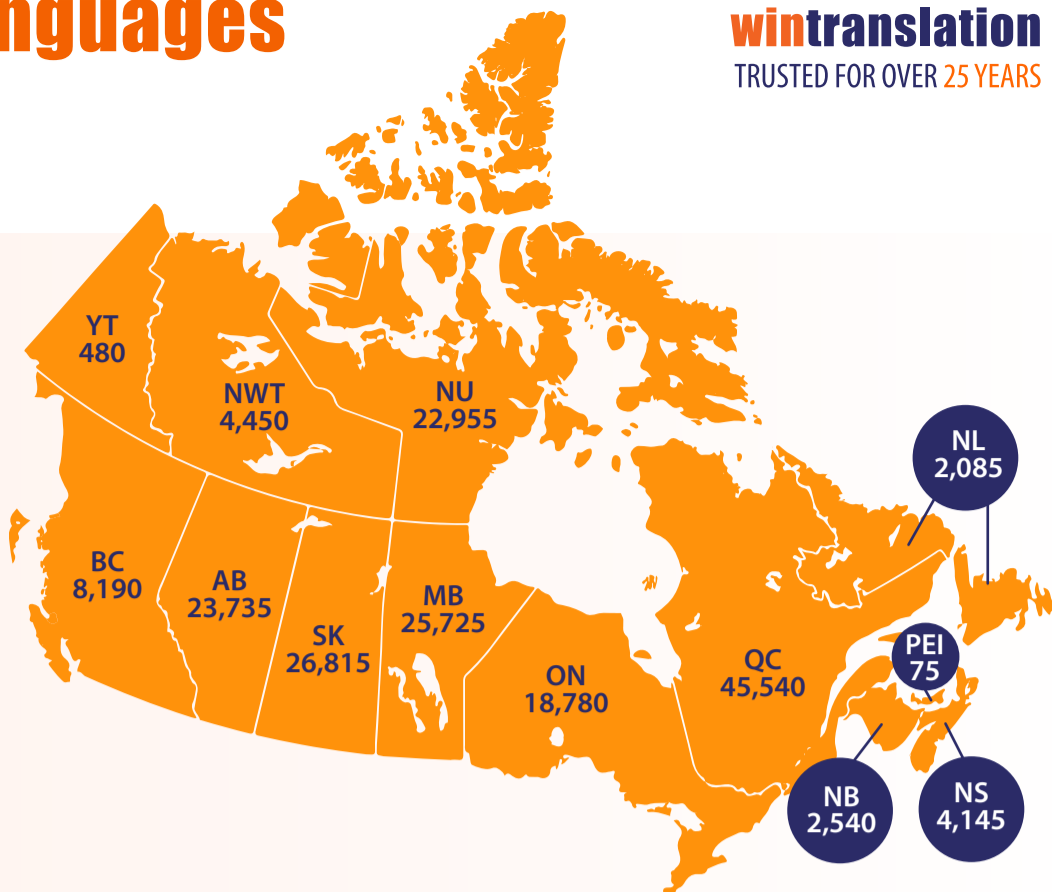


Indigenous languages in Canada

237,420 Indigenous people report speaking an Indigenous language nationally.

184,170 of Indigenous people have an Indigenous mother tongue.

There are more than 70 distinct Indigenous languages spoken across Canada.



These are the **three** most spoken Indigenous languages in Canada:

Inuktitut **Innu** **Cree**



These languages comprise more than **two thirds** of all Indigenous languages spoken as mother tongue across Canada.



Over **25%** of Indigenous language speakers

learned an Indigenous language as their second language

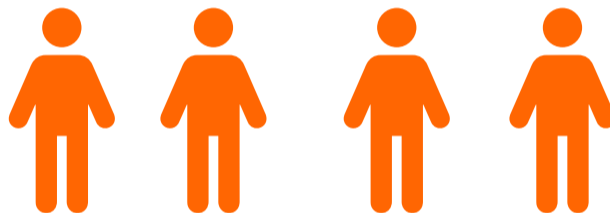
Quebec has the highest number of Indigenous language speakers in any province in Canada.



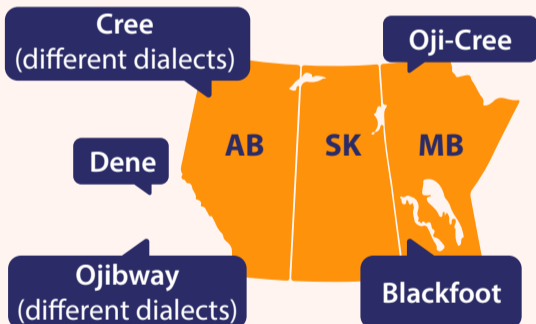
About **1 IN 5** people with native proficiency in an Indigenous language lives in Quebec.

The most spoken Indigenous languages in Quebec are:

Inuktitut **Innu** **Atikamekw** **Naskapi**

The most spoken Indigenous languages in Ontario are:



Ojibway languages are the most spoken Indigenous languages among First Nations people in Ontario.

*Mohawk, Cayuga and Oneida may be underrepresented because Haudenosaunee First Nations has traditionally not participated in the Census.

More than **50%** of First Nations people who speak an Indigenous language live in the Prairies region.

Inuit Nunangut, the homeland of Inuit in Canada, includes four regions:

The Inuvialuit Settlement Region (part NWT)

Nunavut

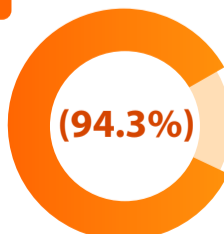
Nunavik (northern Quebec)

Nunatsiavut (part of Labrador)



It is home to over **2/3** of the total Inuit population.
